Foreword

The Aim to Sustain Game Assurance Scheme allows game farms, game shoots and estates to demonstrate publicly that they operate to the highest standards. The standards laid out in this document cover ‘best practice’ across a broad spectrum of topics applicable to game management on game farms¹.

These standards include assessment of animal health and welfare, food quality, environmental enhancement and protection, staff training and health and safety. Certified Game Assurance Scheme members will have produced evidence during a robust assessment process to show how they meet the standards that make up this scheme and earn their certified status. All members will comply with the general standards and at least one other module (rearing, hatching or breeding), depending upon the scope of the operation.

The scheme gives confidence to the public and consumers that where they see the Aim to Sustain assurance stamp, the game farm operates to the highest standards and produces high quality game birds, having been through the independent assessment process.

¹ All references to game farms can apply to shoots producing their own game birds (laying, hatching and rearing).

General Standards

Section 1 – Game farm procedures & operation

Game farms must comply with all legal obligations and must be maintained and operated in a manner that does not bring the game farm, shooting sector or the Aim to Sustain Game Assurance Scheme into disrepute. Game farms must abide by the Scheme rules as detailed in the Members’ Handbook.

Use of GPS/OS grids or What3Words to highlight key locations.
1.3 R T	The game farm key contact list and an emergency action plan must be in place and displayed.	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> Contact list and emergency action plan is up to date understood and <u>accessible</u> to all those involved with the game farm. Contact list includes: Person with overall responsibility for bird welfare, vet, energy, feed and water suppliers, equipment engineers (ventilation, heating, water etc), Animal and Plant Health Agency (APHA), Environment Agency/SEPA, and details of key trained/qualified persons if applicable. The emergency action plan must assess the critical risks for all farm operations and may include (but not be limited to) <u>actions</u> to be taken in the event of: equipment/systems failure, suspected disease outbreak (and associated bio-security measures and visitor records), activist activity, fire, staff accident or illness, extreme weather, absence of key trained person, transportation breakdown or delay.

Section 2 - Bio security

Game farms must be able to demonstrate that effective and robust systems are in place and if required, equipment and materials will be available to prevent the spread of a notifiable disease.

Section 3 - Pest and predator control

Game farms must be able to demonstrate that systems are in place for the effective and responsible control of pests and predators.

Section 4 - Traceability of stock

Game farms must be able to demonstrate that all stock (birds/chicks/eggs) can be traced into and out of the farm to ensure disease control can be managed effectively.

Section 5 - Health and welfare

Game farms must be able to demonstrate that good husbandry ensures the health and welfare of the game birds is being managed to the highest of standards.

Section 6 - Veterinary medicines

Game farms must be able to demonstrate the responsible and competent use of veterinary medicines and treatments.

Section 7 - Animal by-products

Game farms must be able to demonstrate that dead birds are managed to meet the legal requirement, to minimise the risk to the environment and limit the spread of disease.

Rearing Standards

Section 8 – Housing

Game farms must be able to demonstrate that the housing for their birds is appropriate for the age and species and enables the birds to grow in a healthy environment and display normal behaviours.

Materials allow cleaning/disinfecting. No sharp edges and floors appropriate to species to avoid foot injuries. Protected against entry of wild birds and pests.
8.3	Birds must be stocked at a rate in accordance with best practice.	<p>Discuss m² available and numbers of birds reared.</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> Pens must of sufficient size to allow birds to exhibit normal behaviour patterns. The maximum stocking density of covered floor space must be 20kg/m²- (Pheasants/partridges/ ducks). Range stocking (total pen area for rearing birds) is recommended to be a maximum of 5 birds (Pheasants/partridges/ ducks) per 1 m².

Section 9 - Feed & Water

Game birds must be provided a nutritionally balanced diet appropriate for the age and species and always have access to clean fresh water.

Section 10 - Transport

Game farms must be able to demonstrate that the farm has systems and equipment are in place to ensure the safe transportation of all birds.

10.1 R T	Birds must only be moved in containers that appropriate for the size and number of birds. Containers must be clean, in good repair, well ventilated. There must be a procedure to provide protection from inclement weather if necessary.	<p>Discussion of transportation processes and inspection of equipment</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Transportation in sacks is not permitted. • Overcrowding must be avoided. • Maintain a thermally comfortable environment. • A minimum of 160 cm² per bird (pheasants/partridge/ducks) of floor space (for reared/adult birds). • Must be secure to prevent birds from escaping. • Vehicles/containers must be thoroughly inspected, cleaned, disinfected (appropriate DEFRA approved disinfectant at recommended dilution) and allowed to dry properly between movement of each batch. • Records must be kept of cleaning schedules.
10.2	Procedures/equipment must be in place to minimise the risk of heat stress when transporting birds.	<p>Discussion of transportation processes and inspection of equipment.
